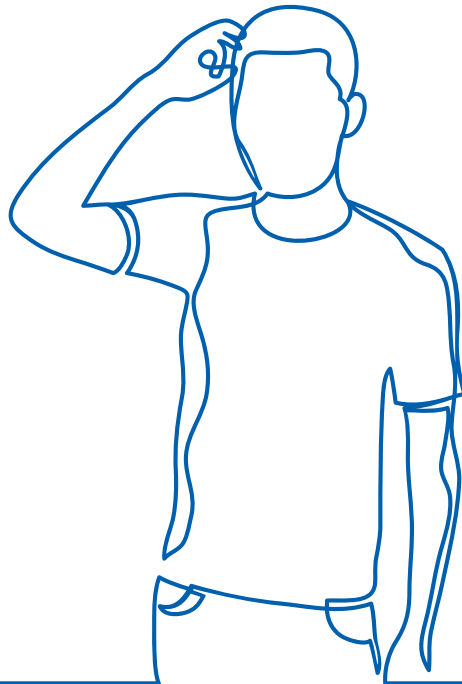


Who's HENRY?

General information

The Hydraulic Engineering Repository, HENRY is a discipline-specific open access repository for hydraulic engineering. The publishing platform, which is operated by the BAW, has been available via the portal section of the Hydraulic Engineering Information Centre since 2017. HENRY provides scientists, engineers and students with free online access to thousands of discipline-specific full texts and their metadata. The content of the repository comprises the BAW's own publications and contributions by other institutions conducting research in hydraulic engineering and related disciplines. HENRY contains already several thousands of publications. It is the largest multi-institutional repository worldwide for hydraulic engineering.

HENRY was launched by the BAW to respond to the recent open access developments and the possibilities of digitalisation, which is evolving ever more rapidly.





Publishing in HENRY

Benefits

- Free service for academic publications and providing scientific knowledge
- Since HENRY is connected to renowned specialist search engines (e.g. Google Scholar, BASE, etc.), authors can **extend their reach** and address a larger international scientific community
- **Individual papers** may be published separately. A reference (e.g. a link) to the original publication is always provided. This improves the quality of the search function when browsing for specific authors and subjects.
- The BAW takes charge of the **technical implementation**. In addition to the complete edition of the conference proceedings, we provide extracts of the individual papers, assign the related metadata, and upload them separately to HENRY – with reference to the original publication of course.
- The assignment of a persistent identifier (HDL identifier) ensures that your publications are citeable.



Requirements

What are the requirements for publishing in HENRY?

Members of scientific institutions (university or non-university, national or international) with a university degree may publish documents in HENRY.

The following types of documents are eligible for publishing:

- Newspaper article
- Series, contribution to a series
- Reference book, contribution to a reference book
- Doctoral thesis, conference proceedings, conference paper, conference poster
- Rules and Standards

Written assignments / term papers by students, bachelor's or master's theses, dissertations, presentation slides and abstracts are not accepted for publication in HENRY.



File types and formats

In order to enable long-term archiving, **files must be submitted as PDF-A** documents. This is the only form which guarantees exact visual reproduction and accessibility and is compliant with ISO 19005-1 for long-term archiving.

For creating a PDF-A document:

- only embedded fonts and images may be used;
- the document must not contain any external links/sources;
- there must be no interactive content;
- the document must not contain any security settings.

How do I submit my publication?

To submit a publication for uploading to HENRY, please send the document along with the relevant metadata to henry@baw.de using either email or a download link. The BAW will verify the files and supplement them if necessary before publishing them in the system.



Legal provisions

To be able to release a publication in HENRY you need to hold the relevant right of use. Making the publication available to the public must not infringe any third-party rights. As the author, you will hold the exploitation rights and rights of use unless you wrote the publication during your working hours (in which case your employer will hold the rights of use) or you have assigned your rights of use to the publisher for the first publication.

The issue of secondary publication

If your publication has already appeared in an academic journal or another external medium, any publication in HENRY constitutes a secondary publication. In such cases, it is important to observe the arrangements laid down in the publication agreement (the agreement concluded between the author and the publisher).

If you have assigned exclusive rights of use to the publisher for the first publication, you must first obtain the publisher's consent for any secondary publication in HENRY because in this case you have no longer any claim to the author's exploitation rights. Many publishers grant at least the right of secondary publication of the **author's postprint** of the publication after a period of 12 to 24 months after initial publication. If you no longer have the original publication agreement, you can obtain information on the publishing houses' general policies from the Sherpa/Romeo list. However, the information in the Sherpa/Romeo list should only be used as a starting point and not be relied upon for legal advice.

You may also publish documents in HENRY that have already been published in **another repository**. A reference to the first publication will be incorporated in the metadata and the cover including a link to the original document.

Licence agreement

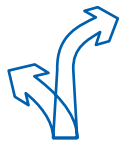
Under the licence agreement, a non-exclusive right of use is granted to the BAW. The licence agreement is concluded between the BAW and the authors and/or institutions.

This will not restrict your exploitation rights. You may also make your publication available to the public via other repositories.

The licence agreement grants the permanent right to the BAW to:

- make electronic copies of the digital publication available to the public and carry out technical modifications to such copies if necessary, in order to make them compatible with future computer systems;
- communicate and transfer digital publications to third parties, in particular for the purpose of long-term archiving;
- transfer the provisions of the licence agreement to another repository, in particular to a successor version of HENRY.

The authors bear sole responsibility for the content of their publications.



Author's postprint

If your work has already been published by a publishing house which only allows a secondary publication of the document as an author's postprint, we will publish the postprint in HENRY. All author's postprint versions published in Henry contain a reference to the original edition.
